The absence of law and justice creates problem of egoism taking over, leading to chaos and eventually man turning to barbarism or environmental destruction. At the same ^{time,} presence of law & justice creates a man full of potential, capable of developing institutions and systems such as democracy, rule of law or values such as liberty, equality and fraternity.

Law and justice are broadly of 2 types. One those which ^{are} natural and other created by man. Natural include man's right to live, to have property, to eat food, etc which are provided to him by the virtue of being a human.

Man made laws are those which help in governing, in leading a peaceful life, in providing security, etc. These laws exist those laws in the form of Constitution, legislations, etc.
